

Dear Parents, Families, and Coldwater Community,
With over 100 days under our belt this school year, our positive culture and Cavalier spirit continue thriving. The energy in our hallways, classrooms, and lunchrooms is palpable. Seeing students, teachers, and even community members embracing spirit days and wearing Cavalier gear brings out the best in all of us. This robust culture and pride drive student success.

As superintendent, I'm honored to lead this special district. However, my duty is also to provide transparent information, even when it's complicated. Partnering with our treasurer, Jenn McCoy, this article outlines our fiscal reality - current and future budget deficits now forcing tough decisions jeopardizing Coldwater's long-term quality.

The board passed an income tax adjustment measure to help curb perpetual deficits without gutting quality programming. This appears on the March 19th primary ballot. We've cut everywhere possible without harming academics. The state budget provides some relief but isn't enough alone. Without new revenue, class size increases and program cuts seem inevitable, drastically impacting the Coldwater experience.

I remain dedicated to transparency regarding district finances and other issues affecting families. We've held community forums and will begin hosting smaller neighborhood gatherings to discuss challenges while dispensing facts, not half-truths or scare tactics. My responsibility is to ensure everyone makes fully informed decisions for themselves and the district. Misinformation helps no one. Please be on the lookout for our neighborhood gatherings to have small group discussions about our school. Please reach out directly with any questions or concerns. I'm always available for honest, thoughtful conversations regarding Coldwater's future. Our community's support empowers the board and administration to make the best long-term decisions for students. The saying Great Communities $=$ Great Schools and Great Schools $=$ Great Communities is the hallmark of Coldwater.

Open enrollment is an issue that has raised questions for some community members. I have articulated the facts in the below message. After reading the below, I encourage you to attend a future neighborhood gathering or contact me directly if you still have questions.

According to the Ohio Department of Education, "Open enrollment allows a student to attend school tuition-free in a district other than the district where his or her parents reside." Sure, it sounds simple enough, but the way open enrollment plays out in Ohio school districts is more nuanced than that.

Out of 658 school districts in the state, 83.3 percent offer some level of open enrollment, including all of the school districts in Mercer and Auglaize Counties.

Coldwater Exempted Village Schools has participated in Ohio's widely used open enrollment program since the 2005-2006 school year. Our district enrollment is currently at 1423 students in grades K-12. We have 214 students who are open enrolled from various school districts. Conversely, we have 46 students who are open enrolled out of our district.

In our community forums and general conversations about the district's financial facts, I am sensing a little bit of skepticism about open enrollment, and I would like to address these concerns as I truly believe, in my professional opinion, that open enrollment comes with great benefits to participating school districts and to students.

Let me make it clear that there are limits to the number of students accepted into our district from outside of the school district. For example, we cap each grade level at a sustainable number of students, and if that cap is reached with students residing inside the school district, then we do not accept students from outside of the district in that grade level. That is generally how open enrollment works. In other words, open enrollment is only used to fill empty seats. That being said, all districts have bubble years in which more students are in certain grade levels due to high birth rates and several other factors. If that is the case, then we make accommodations to meet the needs of our district residents and will add classroom staff, if necessary, to accommodate larger grade levels. We also look at historical trends of students who move into the district or resident students who enroll after we set our staffing levels for the following school year. We ensure we have room for additional district students that may be added during the summer or the next school year.

Open enrollment has many benefits - more choices for families, more choices for students through expanded course and extracurricular offerings and a more diverse student population. Additionally, open enrollment helps combat our state's fragmented school funding model. Because all districts in Mercer County participate in the state's open enrollment program, if a Coldwater resident chooses to attend another school district, the state's funding for that student follows him or her, which means our school district loses critical state funding. The converse is also true - if a child from outside our district attends Coldwater, then the state funding for that child follows that child. Since 2005, the district has offset the expense of resident students attending school elsewhere and increased our state funding by accepting students from other districts. From a financial perspective, in fiscal year 2024, open enrollment will generate approximately $\$ 1,311,951.88$ for the school year - more than two times the emergency levy passed in 2012, generating $\$ 550,000.00$ annually. The 46 Coldwater residents the district lost to open enrollment accounts for $\$ 226,906.50$ in lost revenue.

Ultimately, the goal is to go beyond cost-neutral and balance the loss of revenue we have from our students attending school in other districts. Our district offers residents great value with excellent education quality and a mindset of carefully stretching our precious resources as far as possible. We are not considering renovating, replacing, or adding classrooms to our buildings because of open enrollment.

An analysis was done regarding open enrollment: If we no longer accepted open enrollment, the district would not receive the $\$ 1,311,951.88$. We looked at aggressively reducing staff without the open enrolled students since we would not have the 214 students. If we were aggressive and reduced 9 teachers, this would raise class sizes in the elementary to an average of 24 , and at the middle school and high school, class sizes would rise to 22-23 with the elimination of many electives. The savings from the reduced staff, using the average teacher salary and all teachers using our benefits plan, would be $\$ 819,000.00$. Please note that the salaries of these teachers that would be eliminated would be much less than the average because the staff is reduced by seniority. Therefore, mathematically, it would hurt our budget by at least $\$ 492,951.88$ if we eliminated open enrollment and reduced staff. In the end, this methodology would hurt our Coldwater resident students.

On January 9, 2024, the Board conducted their annual organizational meeting. The organizational meeting is required by the Ohio Revised Code to be held within the first fifteen days of January of each year, and shall organize to elect a president and vice president for a one-year term. Therefore, the board elected Terry Schroyer as President and Jack Waite as Vice President. Additionally, the following regular board meetings will be held on the second Tuesday of the month, with the exception of June and
 November, in the Cav Room, beginning at 6:00 p.m. for the 2024 year:

## Financial Update

We have received our tax year 2023 rates and amounts from the Mercer County Auditor. Below is a chart that shows the area schools effective property tax millage rates along with current income tax rates. We have the increase in valuations already forecasted in our financials.

Our enrollment continues to grow while we have not replaced some positions the last few years to cut down on expenditures. On the following page is a chart which shows the staff to student ratio of the area schools.

Our forecasted budget deficits continue to grow each year. I continue to look for grants and look for ways to cut expenditures without affecting the student experience. Without a steady increase in revenues, our deficits will continue to grow and our savings account will be depleted. For this reason, the board of education has approved to issue a replacement levy for an additional income tax of $1.25 \%$ which would make the school income tax a total of $1.75 \%$. I hope the Ohio legislators can come together and approve the full funding of the Fair School Funding Formula to give public schools the true cost of what is costs to educate a student to help put us in a better financial position. Had they done so when the new formula was presented, the board of education would not have had to rely on more local funding.

## 3rd Grade ELA Ohio State Test - Fall Results

All third grade students took the Ohio ELA Fall test on Oct. 24 and Oct. 25, 2023. This test is designed to assess knowledge gained by the end of the third grade year. It will also be administered again in the spring on April 16th and 17th. This test is given twice a year to allow us to monitor and measure each student's progress and growth. Any third grade student who scores a Third Grade Reading Promotion Score of at least 48 or an overall Scaled Score of at least 690 on either the fall or spring test is eligible to be promoted to the 4th Grade and passes the Third Grade Reading Guarantee. Students who have been identified and placed on an IEP for ELA and EL students who have been enrolled in a U.S. school for less than three full school years are eligible to be promoted to 4th grade regardless of their scores. Students are also placed in a performance level based on their scaled score (1-limited, 2 -basic, 3 -proficient, 4 -accelerated, 5 -advanced). Our goal is for every student to at least score a 700 (proficient) or higher on the spring test or move up one performance level. Below is a summary of the fall results:

## School Safety/Winter Safety

Here is another friendly reminder of some safety tips to reinforce with your child at home to help them stay safe when walking, riding a bike, or getting dropped off/ picked up at school.

## Walking/Biking

- Walk/Ride with a friend when possible.
- Ask your parents to help you pick a safe route to school; one that avoids dangers.
- Stick to the route you picked with your parents. Don't let friends talk you into shortcuts that are more dangerous.
- When you are near the street, don't push, shove, or chase each other.
- Always use the crosswalk.
- Pay attention to cars and always be looking out for vehicles. Don't expect them to notice or stop for you as you always need to make sure there are no cars coming when crossing a street or intersection.


## Dropped Off/Picked Up

- Enter through the assigned door before 8:00 a.m. After 8:00 a.m. enter at the most convenient door from Circle Drive.
- Parents when dropping your child off at the beginning of the day, please use the drop off line, or park in the visitors lot and walk your child across the crosswalk.
- Parents also need to walk their children across Vine Street when they park in the visitor's parking lot. PLEASE USE THE TWO DESIGNATED CROSSWALKS.
- While waiting to get picked up at the end of the day, please listen for your car number or name and slowly walk to exit out of the building to Circle Drive.
- Stay beside Mr. Etzler until he or a staff member tells you what cone to stand by. Then WALK to your car after it has stopped.
- Always enter/exit the vehicle on the curbside.
- Parents are asked not to use their cell phones as their children are in the drop off zone for safety purposes.
- Please be very careful pulling out of the pick up line. SLOW DOWN...everyone's safety is at risk!
* As a reminder, please talk with your children about winter safety when traveling to and from school and to wear proper clothing for those cold days. Please note the guidelines we will follow for inclement weather for recess.
$\Rightarrow 20$ degrees or lower: Students stay inside
$\Rightarrow$ 21-32 degrees: Students can be inside, outside, or combined depending on wind chill and precipitation
$\Rightarrow 33$ degrees or higher: Students outside unless precipitation
* PLEASE REMEMBER TO DRIVE SLOWLY THROUGH THE SCHOOL ZONE, DROP OFF/PICK UP ZONE AND THROUGH THE ELEMENTARY PARKING LOT. PAY ATTENTION TO PEDESTRIANS AND CARS PULLING OUT OF SPACES. You as a driver have a big responsibility in keeping our students safe. Thank you!

Also, at this time parents/guardians will be able to schedule an appointment for Kindergarten screening. If parents are unable to attend the meeting, please call the Elementary Office (419-678-2613) to schedule an appointment.

Coldwater's Kindergarten Screening will be held on Thursday, March 21 and Friday, March 22 in the elementary library center and kindergarten classrooms. At the time of the screening, parents will NEED to bring a birth certificate, immunization records, and custody papers (if applicable). We look forward to this time we get to spend with you and your child.

## Mercer County Educational Service Center Early Identification Child Find

If you have concerns for your 3, 4 , or 5 year old child about their speech or any potential developmental delay, the Mercer County ESC is here to help! The Child Find will be held at the Mercer County Educational Service Center on these dates: February 23, March 22, April 26, and May 24, 2024 from 8:30-12:00 p.m. This screening is not a requirement in order to enroll in preschool but can be used to help identify any potential learning needs. The free screening will cover:

- Articulation/Language
- Fine Motor/Gross Motor
- Hearing/Vision
- General Knowledge/Pre-Academics

## The power of "YET"...Help your Cavalier have a GROWTH MINDSET " 5 Easy Ways to Encourage a Growth Mindset in Your Child"

1. Lead by Example: Many of us have a fixed mindset about something in our life, and it is important for us as parents to challenge ourselves as much as we seek to challenge our kids. If they see us tackle our own problems as a challenge to be solved, they'll learn to do the same. Conversely if they see us lash out and blame others for our own failures, they will learn to think that they are not in control of their destiny and that life is nothing more than the roll of the dice.

2. Call off the rescue mission!: As parents, all we want to do is protect our children from life's hurts and disappointments. Unfortunately, when we constantly bail them out of difficult situations caused by their own poor choices, they never gain the opportunity to develop their own coping strategies to manage setbacks.
3. Failure is a good thing! : Without a sense of failure, we would never be motivated to learn anything new. If everything came easy to us, life would be incredibly boring. We can all remember a time in our life where we worked really hard on something and it paid off. Few of us can recall the time we got an A on an assignment that came easy to us. This is because the reward is actually in the hard work (and the struggle). Children need to learn that it's okay to make a mistake. In fact, it's a necessary part of the learning process.
4. Change your vocabulary: Henry Ford once said, "Whether you think you can or you think you can't, either way you're right!" Instead of "I can't..." "I'm bored..." "I give up..." it's important to teach children to approach difficult tasks with "I can..." "What am I missing?" "What strategies have I learned before that could help me now?" The words we choose are a powerful indicator of the type of mindset we carry with us through life.
5. The Power of Yet: Instead of dwelling on their shortcomings, children need to learn to identify the next steps to greater achievement. It's not that they don't understand something...it's that they don't understand something yet! Next time your child comes home with a bad grade, instead of focusing on all the things that went wrong, focus your energy on the next steps they can take to improve their skills. Do they need to study more? Develop strategies to cope with test anxiety? Put in more effort? Whatever it is, teach them to learn from their mistakes and move on. The learning that comes as a result of the grade is much more valuable than the grade itself.

To prepare for kindergarten, our Little Cavaliers need to be supported and nurtured in all areas of development. It is also important that your Little Cav is physically, socially and emotionally ready to participate in school. Our team of teachers are very well trained and prepared to help your child be their best academically. If your child is kindergarten ready, our team will make sure your child gets the academic instruction needed for them to be their best self. The following list can serve as a guide as you and your child prepare for the exciting transition to kindergarten at Coldwater Elementary!

- Use classroom tools and toys efficiently?
$\Rightarrow$ Cutting with scissors
$\Rightarrow$ Holding and using a pencil, crayon or marker
$\Rightarrow$ Building with blocks or Legos
- Express self-awareness in a variety of ways?
$\Rightarrow$ Knowing first and last name
$\Rightarrow$ Writing first name
$\Rightarrow$ Naming the letters in the first name
$\Rightarrow$ Knowing the name of the primary caregiver(s)
Please remember, young children develop and change constantly. Help your Little Cav make successful transitions from home to school. If he or she cannot do something this week, you may see them do it a couple of weeks later. Providing opportunities to practice these skills through daily routine and experiences will help foster your child's independence and love of learning.


## Early Literacy Tips for Preschoolers

## At Home

- TALKING - As you are preparing a meal, invite your child to help. Talk about what you are doing, how you are doing it or the food you are preparing (name, color, texture, taste, or where it comes from).
- SINGING - Singing is a great way to learn new vocabulary and help children understand sentence structure by slowing language down. Try to sing songs about everyday routines such as getting dressed, washing hands, or making breakfast.
- READING - Encourage your child to choose books he/she is interested in, even if you feel that the story is too long for their attention span or bedtime. Try going on a "picture walk" through the story where you discuss what you see going on in the illustrations; you can even make up your own story about what is happening in the pictures you see.
- WRITING - When coloring or scribbling, encourage your child to write as much as he/she can about what they are drawing. This will help him understand that written words stand for spoken language.
- PLAYING - Dress-up is a fun and inexpensive way to introduce your child to storytelling. Provide them with old clothes and other household props to help them act out favorite stories - or make up their own! Encourage them to think about how a story progresses through the beginning, middle, and end.


## On the Go

- TALKING - Engage your child in conversation while in the car. Talk about where you are headed, what you did last time you were there if it's a familiar place, or what new and exciting things you will do if it's somewhere your child has never been.
- SINGING - Keep a CD or a playlist of your child's favorite songs in the car. Sing along with them (or sing made-up songs!) to help your child hear syllables, word sounds and new vocabulary.
- READING - Words are all around us! Point out letters or simple words that your child may recognize, such as ones that start with the same letter as his/her name or easy rhyming words.
- WRITING - While waiting in line or at the doctor's office, do a simple finger play or rhyme that gets their hands moving, like "Itsy, Bitsy Spider" or "Open Them, Shut Them". Moving and stretching their fingers will help them build the fine motor skills they'll need to write and draw.
- PLAYING - Play a game of "I Spy" while in the car. Take this opportunity to work on building your child's vocabulary by picking things they may be unfamiliar with or by using very descriptive language to help them guess the item you see.


## 5 Parent Tips for "Little Cav" READING Success

## 1. Read Regularly

Try to read to your child every day. You might aim for 10-15 minutes of bedtime reading for a peaceful end to the day. Bring along a book, and read to your child during a sibling's sports practice. Or curl up together with a book when you get home from work.

## 2. Take Turns Choosing Books

Your child may want to hear old favorites again and again. Use your turn for new titles and variety (nonfiction, poetry).

## 3. Let Them Participate

Ask your child to turn the pages while you read. Also, they can finish sentences that rhyme or fill in the words they know. Go slowly so they have time to understand the story and look at the illustrations. They'll enjoy read-aloud time more if they play an active role.

## 4. Be Playful

You can use different voices for different characters (a high, squeaky voice for a mouse or a deep, booming voice for a horse). Or substitute your youngster's name for the main character's name, and use family members' names for other characters. Note: You don't have to be an expert reader - your child will love it when you read aloud because it's you.

## 5. Boost Their Vocabulary

A large vocabulary can turn your child into a better reader and writer. Try these everyday ways to help them learn new words:
Keep your ears open: When you and your youngster go places, point out words that people use. Maybe a waiter describes an entree or the dentist talks about molars. Encourage your child to figure out what they mean by the way they're used.

Go beyond nouns: Help your youngster add verbs and adjectives to their vocabulary. Sports and games offer opportunities to use action words. Let your child hear you comment on the softball that soars or the runner who sprints. When they write or send thank you notes or greeting cards, suggest descriptive words (a polka-dot shirt, a fantastic birthday).

9. January, February and March bring us warm Soup days on Tuesday for Stage Line grades 7-12. Be on the lookout for either our awesome Cheese soup, Chili soup or Chicken noodle soup.
10. If your children don't care for the fruit or vegetables being served that day, please remind them that we typically have fresh apples, oranges or bananas available, as well as carrots and celery. Your kids are welcome to choose those alternate fruits or vegetables that are put out that day instead.
11. Reminder: We have a "sharing pail" at the end of the main service lines. Any unused fruit or drinks that students have not claimed or set aside will be cleaned off and placed in the "sharing pail." This helps reduce food waste and teaches students to share extra food with others who may want it, rather than throwing it away. Students are encouraged to take items from the "sharing pail" if they are still hungry, thirsty after their initial meal or don't have the money on their account to get that extra item.

As a reminder, lunch prices this year are:
K-8: \$2.15 per day: 9-12: \$2.25 per day
To receive these prices, students must take at least 3 of the 5 meal components offered, including a fruit or vegetable. If not, they are charged $\$ 2.75$ for an incomplete meal. The 5 components are: Meat/Meat Alternative, Grain, Milk, Fruit, and Vegetable.

Thank you for raising such wonderful students. We are already in the third quarter and the children continue to be great in the cafeteria.
