Families and Community Members:

As superintendent of Coldwater Exempted Village Schools, I am proud to help lead this district now and into the future. However, my responsibility is to provide transparent information about our school. One piece of that information is about district finances. Partnering with our treasurer, Jenn McCoy, and adhering to state regulations, we can articulate facts about our current and future budgetary issues. In that spirit, this article outlines Coldwater's fiscal challenges, revenue constraints, and the deficits now forcing difficult decisions that impact long-term educational quality. The board of education has passed a resolution, certified by the Department of Taxation,



to replace our .5% traditional income tax with a 1.75% earned income tax. We have done everything possible to curb the deficit spending and have worked with a streamlined staff to reduce those costs. The new biennium state budget does help; however, we still need to solve our financial situation. Without a levy or new revenue streams, class sizes would increase dramatically in the future.

As a district, unforgiving math drives our fiscal state - with yearly shortfalls between revenues and expenses, we are slowly threatening cash reserves. While controlling costs wherever possible, essential expenditures have outpaced stagnant state funding for years - forcing us to cover differences by drawing down savings to sustain our daily expenses. Those savings now dwindle low while costs march upwards, necessitating urgent action to secure our financial footing.

The core reality remains a structural mismatch between major expenses and available revenues:

- Personnel accounts for 83% of our \$16 million budget covering our incredible teachers and staff.
 Despite restrained 0% 2% raises averaging way under inflation, state funding fails to recognize rising education costs. These baseline costs rise steadily outside our direct control.
- Local funding provides only \$22 per pupil daily This rate is the lowest of schools in the area. This rate provides about 40% of our revenues.
- Voter-approved emergency operating funds from 2012 generate a fixed amount of revenue of \$550,000. This amount comes from property tax with an effective rate of 2.9 mills. The district will let this levy expire if new revenues are realized from the measure on the ballot on March 19, 2024

As a result, we've accumulated \$1.3 million combined deficits since 2018 - bridging revenue shortfalls by drawing cash reserves down. At continuing rates, reserves will fully deplete within the next few years - calling into question fiscal sustainability.

In summary - through strategic but difficult choices, we've maintained excellence despite state funding failures, keeping pace with our community's real needs and expectations. However, challenging math cannot be ignored, as yearly deficits erode past flexibility. Either we align revenues with expenses, or we fail coming generations. I welcome transparent conversations to solve this issue - but inaction no longer remains an option.

Key takeaways surrounding the facts:

WHAT WOULD THE OPERATING LEVY FUND?

- ♦ The levy is a 1.75% earned income tax continuing levy that would fund daily operations and maintain current academic programming and staffing levels so that the district can continue providing the current quality of education for Coldwater students.
- This levy replaces the .5% traditional income tax that was passed in 1990. It is important to note that this new levy will only be assessed on earned income from a paycheck. Thus, retirees will not be assessed this income tax on retirement or investment income.

WHY AN EARNED INCOME TAX LEVY?

If we would place a property tax levy on the ballot, it would be a 12.9 mill levy. This would cost a homeowner \$451 per year for an assessed value of \$100,000.00. Therefore, we request the earned income tax to protect our retired community members and large property owners. It also puts us in the same range of 210 school districts in Ohio with an income tax to produce revenue for the school.

• WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF THE LEVY FAILS?

If the levy would fail, approximately \$1 million - about 12 positions- would have to be cut within the next 2 years. This would amount to a significant restructuring of the district, including cuts to academic programming that would include cuts to staff, resulting in much larger class sizes.

WHAT HAVE COLDWATER SCHOOLS DONE TO CONTROL COSTS?

In 2018-2019, Coldwater Schools employed 153 staff members for 1326 students; this coming school year, Coldwater Schools employed 146 staff members for 1429 students. Please note that our enrollment has increased yearly since the 2018-2019 school year. This coming school year, we added a kindergarten teacher included in the 146 staff members total. The reason for adding a new kindergarten teacher is due to having over 140 kindergarteners enrolled along with all other elementary grade levels at their preferred class averages thus, we have no current staff we could move to that position. Since the school's budget comprises about 83% of personnel salaries due to being a service industry, the teachers and staff have consistently taken minimal raises, if not a 0%, to help contain our costs. In addition, in 2020, the district moved from a PPO health insurance plan to a high-deductible HSA plan to control costs. During the COVID years, the district also utilized COVID grants given to us by state and federal agencies to cover some of our salary expenditures to provide continuous service. Furthermore, as a district, we have been very frugal in purchasing supplies and using every possible measure to control our energy costs.

We will be engaging the entire community in transparent conversations, including community forums, neighborhood coffees, and other community engagement opportunities leading up to election day on March 19, 2024. Our first community engagement forum will be:

When: Wednesday December 13, 2023

Time: 6:30 PM - 7:30 PM

Where: Coldwater Eagles on the hall side of the establishment.

This community forum is an opportunity to learn the transparent facts regarding the future of Coldwater Schools. As the superintendent, I will present the facts and allow time for a question-and-answer period. We must have an opportunity to discuss this in person so that everyone in our community is equipped with the actual facts and the needs facing the district. Also, at this forum, members of the levy committee will attend and answer questions about how they will serve this community and areas in which they need assistance. I hope that the community will come together and attend our community forum to learn the facts about the challenges we face as a district.

FROM THE DESK OF THE TREASURER, JENN MCCOY:

Financial Update

The Board of Education approved Coldwater Schools Five Year Forecast during the November board meeting. You are more than welcome to review the forecast and notes on the Ohio Department of Education website. Please contact me if you have any questions regarding the district's finances or five-year forecast.

As you will see in the forecast, our cash balance remains positive through FY28 but we fall below the 60 days operating cash board policy in FY27. We continue to be in deficit spending which is having a large negative impact on our cash reserves. A couple things I highlighted with the board of education: we currently have the lowest allowed effective millage in the state being paid on property tax along with the lowest property tax per student and income tax per student in Mercer & Auglaize counties. We have made cuts through staff attrition and continue to make cuts throughout our other expenditures but the problem lies in our revenues not keeping up with our increasing expenditures. Our state funding has been flat for the past ten years while more unfunded mandates are put on public schools. The Ohio legislators continue not to give public schools the true cost of what is costs to educate a student which then puts more tax burden on our local taxpayers.

I am deeply grateful for the steadfast support our community continues to provide Coldwater Schools. It is a privilege to operate in a community that exhibits such dedication to its youth and their education. Your commitment has been integral in fostering the nurturing learning environment and breadth of opportunities available to our students here. Please know that your efforts have built something truly special at Coldwater Schools - an environment where students can thrive. Thank you again for all you do for our students.

Grants

Coldwater EVSD has received a Staff Wellness Grant in the amount \$5,300 which will be used towards mental health and wellness within the buildings.

Notes from the Nurse

Here are a few notes and reminders from the School Nurse:


Vision and Hearing Screenings: All students in K, 1, 3, 5, 7 (vision only), 9, and 11
are screened for vision and hearing. If any student fails either of these screenings I
am required to send a referral home to the parents with those results. Communicate with your child's teachers if there are any vision/hearing concerns that may
affect them in the classroom.



- All medications sent to school need to be in their original container, cannot be expired, and must be accompanied with a note from the prescriber (if prescription). If it is an over-the-counter medication, a note from the parent is required. Forms are in each building office for both prescription and non-prescription medications.
 Turn all medication into the building office. Sometimes EpiPens and inhalers can be carried by the student, but that must be indicated on the prescription medication form.
- Students should stay home from school if:
 - The child has a fever greater than 100.4*
 - 2. The illness prevents the child from participating in school activities.
 - 3. The child has a fever, lethargy (tiredness), irritability, persistent crying, difficulty breathing, or any other signs of severe illness.
 - 4. The child is vomiting and/or has frequent diarrhea.
 - 5. The child has an unexplained rash (especially with a fever and/or behavior changes).
 - 6. The child has signs or symptoms of Covid-19 even if no fever or other symptoms listed above.

Be sure to report your child's illness to the building office. If the child goes to the doctor, get a doctor's note to excuse the absence.
















Cavalier Way 1st Quarter Assembly


The Cavalier Way Award Winners - 1st Quarter

Excellent Attendance

Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours if possible. If your child asks to stay home "just because", remind him of what he'll miss, such as reading/math groups or gym class. Explain that school is a privilege, priority, and it is very important to not miss out on anything.

Safety: Traveling To and From School

Students getting to and from school safely is very important. Here are some safety tips to reinforce with your child at home to help them stay safe when walking, riding a bike, or getting dropped off/picked up at school.

Walking/Biking

- Walk/Ride with a friend when possible.
- Ask your parents to help you pick a safe route to school; one that avoids dangers.
- Stick to the route you picked with your parents. Don't let friends talk you into shortcuts that are more dangerous.
- When you are near the street, don't push, shove, or chase each other.
- Always use the crosswalk.
- Pay attention to cars and always be looking out for vehicles. Don't expect them to notice or stop for you as you always need to make sure there are no cars coming when crossing a street or intersection.

Dropped Off/Picked Up

- In Circle Drive, if you arrive before 8:00 a.m. please wait by and enter through the grade level assigned door. After 8:00 a.m. you may enter through any Circle Drive door that is most convenient for you.
- While waiting to get picked up at the end of the day, listen when your number is called, stand behind
 the color cone that you have been told to wait by, keep hands/feet to yourself, and wait patiently for
 your car to pull up to the cone.
- Wait until your car is completely stopped before walking to get into it.
- Always enter/exit the vehicle on the curbside.

PARENT Reminder: Drop Off / Pick Up

- Please cross Vine St. at the crosswalks only. We expect our students to do this to be safe. Set a good example and be a good model.
- Drive slowly through the Circle Drive drop off/pick up line. Please drive **SLOWLY** through the parking lot. Remember this is a parking lot and not a street.
- Please pay attention to the staff directing the drop off/pick up line so that it runs smoothly.
- Be courteous and conscientious of your surroundings. **Drive respectfully...little eyes are watching!**

PARENT TIPS: Working Together for School Success

5 Parent Tips for "Little Cav" Success

1. Stick to a Routine

Children benefit from having a consistent bedtime and wake time each day. Taking time to have breakfast in the morning is very important to get the day started. If your children spend a lot of time deciding what to wear and in preparing their backpack in the morning, add these activities to their nighttime routine to have a smooth start to the day. Having a consistent homework time each day is an important component in building study skills.

2. Support Homework Independence

Once students are able to read the directions on their homework, they should complete their assignments by themselves. Students may ask for help because they enjoy the parental attention, but this can lead to asking for help when they don't need it. When children do their homework without a reminder and on their own, this is a good time to acknowledge their independence.

3. Think Long-Term

Children who have a long-term goal often have increased motivation in school. Setting a long-term goal with your child can help connect the relevancy of your child's daily activities with the future. It is never too early to think about developing time management skills. Using time wisely by completing homework and chores quickly enables children to have more time for fun activities.

4. Have a Positive Learning Attitude

Attitudes are infectious and an integral component to having success. Parents who have a positive attitude towards learning and school can excite children with their enthusiasm. On the other hand, their mindset may be affected by parents who are upset with the teacher or school. Showing interest in your children's studies by asking questions can foster motivation and a positive learning attitude.

5. Connect with the Teacher

Building a relationship with your child's teacher can help you understand how your child is doing at school and how you can help your child best at home. Try to meet with the teacher as much as necessary. Working as a team, this partnership can make the school year go more smoothly for you and your child.

READ, READ, READ: Develop an Early Reader

Want to spend time with your child, build their reading skills, and help them to love books? You can do all three when you read aloud. Here are suggestions:

- * Read Regularly: Try to read to or with your child every day. You might aim for 10-15 minutes of bed-time reading. Bring along a book, and read to them during a sibling's sports practice. Curl up together with a book when you get home from work.
- * Take Turns Choosing Books: Your child may want to hear old favorites again and again. Use your turn for new titles and variety (nonfiction, poetry, etc.).
- * Let Them Participate: Ask your child to turn the pages while you read. Also, they can finish sentences that rhyme or fill in words they know. Go slowly so they have time to understand the story and look at the illustrations. They'll enjoy read-aloud time more if they play an active role.
- * Be Playful: You can use different voices for different characters (a high, squeaky voice for a mouse or a deep, booming voice for a horse). Or substitute your child's name for the main character's name, and use family members' names for other characters.

Remember, you don't have to be an expert reader...your child will love it when you read to or with them because it's you:).






Cavalier Community,


Coldwater High School Social Studies Field Trip to Ft. Recovery

On Friday, November 17th, Coldwater High School U.S. Studies and AP U.S. History students visited the Ft. Recovery Museum in Ft. Recovery, Ohio. Students viewed the new exhibit, St. Clair's Defeat Revisited: A New View of the Conflict. This free exhibit introduced the students to a Native perspective of the complex history of St. Clair's Defeat, which took place on the very ground that the village of Fort Recovery sits on. The exhibit was co-created by Ball State University and 11 Tribal Humanities Scholars descended from the Tribal fighters in St. Clair's Defeat. Fort Recovery is honored to have this exhibit at Fort Recovery before it travels to the Fort Wayne History Center, Northeast Oklahoma A&M College in Miami OK in 2024, and to the Ohio History Center in 2025.

Fort Recovery Museum Site Manager, Kim Rammel invited us to come over for the program and Christine Thompson, who is the Assistant Director and Archeologist at Ball State University discussed various topics regarding the exhibit with the students. The exhibit included a 15-minute welcome video that contains all Native voices. The exhibit itself covers four themes – including the Background of the Northwest Indian War, the Battle (St. Clair's Defeat), the Aftermath of broken treaties, removal of Native people, and boarding schools, and the Persistence of Tribes today. Also included are art items made by today's Tribal citizens. Special thanks go out to Coldwater Administration for promoting this opportunity for our students, as well as, to Kim Rammel and Christine Thompson of the Ft. Recovery Museum for their help in coordinating this event with our school.






