

Title I Parent Handbook

This parent handbook is provided to familiarize you with the Title I program at Coldwater Exempted Village Schools. The Title I program is developed through the efforts of parents, teachers, administrators, and Title I staff. In this handbook you will find the following: Staff members, an overview of the program, multi-criterion on how students are selected, school-parent engagement district policy, school-parent engagement plan, parent rights notice, school-parent compact, and parent resources.

Title I: An Overview

Title I is a federally funded education program that works to give all qualified students a chance to achieve proficiency on Ohio's challenging academic achievement standards. Its purpose is to prevent failure by ensuring that more children experience success in school. Sometimes children need assistance to meet the standards Ohio has set for all children. This includes children who:

- Have trouble reading words
- Read below their grade level
- Have trouble understanding what they read
- Have trouble with reading fluency which impacts the student's comprehension

Classes for the program take place during the regular school day and will meet 4 to 5 times each week for 20 to 30 minutes each time. During the class, your child will review reading skills appropriate for their grade level. The regular classroom teacher and the Title I teacher will work closely together to reinforce the skills covered in the regular classroom. This program is a remediation tool, and the goal is to strengthen your child's reading skills.

Participation in the Title 1 program is based upon parent/guardian approval. You do have the right to refuse assistance for your child.

Title I: Student Multi-Criterion Selection

The program is planned through a series of steps.

Kindergarten: In the middle of the school year, all Coldwater students participated in the Acadience reading assessment, which is an universal screener designed to provide information about each student's current basic reading performance. This information, along with recommendations from his/her classroom teacher, indicates that your child would benefit from some small group review. The tool to provide this intervention at Coldwater is the Title I program.

Grades 1-3: At the beginning of the school year, all Coldwater students participated in the Acadience reading assessment, which is an universal screener designed to provide information about each student's current basic reading performance. This information along with a pre-reading screener and regular classroom teacher recommendations and prior experience in Title I services indicates that your child would benefit from small group review.

Title I: School-Parent Engagement Policy

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TITLE I PROGRAMS

The Title I program is based on an annual assessment of educational needs. This assessment includes identification of educationally deprived children in the public and private schools in this District. Title I services are provided to all eligible, educationally deprived students.

The Board believes parent and family involvement is a vital part of the Title I program. The Superintendent/designee jointly develops with and distributes to parents of children participating in Title I programs within the District a written parent and family involvement policy and guidelines. The written parent and family involvement policy includes a School-Parent Compact jointly developed by the school and the parents. The requirements of the policy, compact and guidelines are consistent with Federal and State law.

Parent and family involvement includes, but is not limited to, parent and family contribution to the design and implementation of programs under this title, development of support and improvement plans, participation by parents and family members in school activities and programs, and training and materials that build parents' and family members' capacity to improve their children's learning in both the home and the school. To build a partnership between home and school, the District:

- 1. informs the parents and family members of the program, the reasons for their children's participation and the specific instructional objectives;
- 2. trains parents and family members to work with their children to attain instructional objectives;
- 3. trains teachers and other staff involved in programs under this title to work effectively with the parents and family members of participating students;
- 4. develops partnerships by consulting with parents and family members regularly;
- 5. provides opportunities for parents and family members to be involved in the design, operation and evaluation of the program and
- 6. provides opportunities for the full participation of parents and family members who lack literacy skills or whose native language is not English. Title I funds are used only to augment, not to replace, state and local funds. The Board uses these funds to provide equivalent or comparable educational services in all schools receiving Title I assistance.

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PARENT AND FAMILY INVOLVEMENT IN EDUCATION (Version 1)

The Board believes that parent and family involvement is an important part of the educational program. Current research indicates that a home-school partnership and greater involvement on the part of parents and families in the education of their children generally result in higher achievement scores, improved student behavior and reduced absenteeism. All parents, family members and foster caregivers are encouraged to take an active role in the education of their children or foster children.

The Board directs the administration to develop along with parents, family members and foster caregivers the necessary regulations to ensure that this policy is followed and that parent and family involvement is encouraged. The regulations are to:

- 1. encourage strong home-school partnerships;
- 2. provide for consistent and effective communication between parents and family members or foster caregivers and school officials;
- 3. offer parents and family members or foster caregivers ways to assist and encourage their children or foster children to do their best and

Title I: School-Parent Engagement Plan

Jointly Developed

Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary will take the following actions to conduct an annual meeting, at a convenient time, and encourage and invite all parents of participating children to attend to inform them about the school's Title I program, the nature of the Title I program, parents' requirements, the school parent and family engagement policy, the schoolwide plan, and the school-parent compact.

* As prescribed in the federal requirements for implementation and participation in Title I programs, Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary will conduct an annual Title I Engagement Meeting during the first nine weeks of school to inform and engage parents in the support of childhood literacy. Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary recognizes and values the input,

cooperation, and collaborative nature of parents in the ongoing efforts to enhance student access and opportunity to Title I initiatives.

Communications

Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary will take the following actions to provide parents of participating children the following:

Various mediums, including print, verbal, and technology-driven formats, will be utilized to reach such stakeholders in a format that is most appropriate for them; 4. School-Parent Compact

Coordination of Services

Also, Wright State Lake Campus has students in the education program who are willing to tutor Title I students (fee) if students are struggling.

Building Capacity of Parents

Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary will build the parents' capacity for strong parent and family engagement to ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school and the community to improve student academic achievement through the following:

- Provide parents with a description and explanation of the curriculum in use at the school, the forms of academic assessments used to measure student progress and the achievement levels of the challenging state academic standards;
- Provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's achievement, such as literacy training and using technology (including education about the harms of copyright piracy), as appropriate, to foster parent and family engagement; and

Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary will provide training to educate teachers, specialized instructional support personnel, principals and other school leaders, and other staff, with the assistance of parents, in the value and utility of contributions of parents and in how to reach out to, communicate with and work with parents as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent programs, and build ties between parents and the school by:

* The faculty and staff of Coldwater Exempted Village Elementary School shall be provided the opportunity for professional development in ways to appropriately engage with students and/or parents/guardians to build capacity, student self-efficacy and enhance the self-esteem of such

children. The school has implemented the Purposeful People Program that supports social-emotional and character development to support learning for the whole child in a safe and caring environment.

Title I: Parent Rights Notice

As a parent of a student at Coldwater Exempted Village Schools, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal Law allows you to ask for certain information about your classroom teachers, and requires us to give you this information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the Ohio State Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- Whether the Ohio State Department of Education decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
- The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

I understand that I will have reasonable access to my student's teachers along with opportunities to participate in my child's class.

As a parent/guardian, I agree to support the learning of my child.

- Establish a time & place for homework & monitor for completion
- Participate in conferences
- Read discuss progress reports
- Monitor my child's attendance
- Encourage my child's efforts in schoolwork and promote positive use of my child's extracurricular time.
- · Help my child in reading skills

General Homework Tips for Parents

- Make sure your child has a quiet, well-lit place to do homework.
 Avoid having your child do homework with the television on or in places with other distractions, such as people coming and going.
- Make sure the materials your child needs, such as paper, pencils and a dictionary, are available.
 - Ask your child if special materials will be needed for some projects and get them in advance.
- Help your child with time management.
 - Establish a set time each day for doing homework. Don't let your child leave homework until just before bedtime. Think about using a weekend morning or afternoon for working on big projects, especially if the project involves getting together with classmates.
- Be positive about homework.
 - Tell your child how important school is. The attitude you express about homework will be the attitude your child acquires.
- When your child does homework, you do homework.
 Show your child that the skills they are learning are related to things you do as an adult. If your child is reading, you read too. If your child is doing math, balance your checkbook.
- When your child asks for help, provide guidance, not answers.
 Giving answers means your child will not learn the material. Too much help teaches your child that when the going gets rough, someone will do the work for him or her.

- When the teacher asks that you play a role in homework, do it.
 Cooperate with the teacher. It shows your child that the school and home are a team. Follow the directions given by the teacher.
- If homework is meant to be done by your child alone, stay away.

 Too much parent involvement can prevent homework from having some positive effects.

 Homework is a great way for kids to develop independent, lifelong learning skills.
- Stay informed.
 - Talk with your child's teacher. Make sure you know the purpose of homework and what your child's class rules are.
- Help your child figure out what is hard homework and what is easy homework.
 Have your child do the hard work first. This will mean he will be most alert when facing the biggest challenges. Easy material will seem to go fast when fatigue begins to set in.
- Watch your child for signs of failure and frustration.
 Let your child take a short break if she is having trouble keeping her mind on an assignment.
- Reward progress in homework.

If your child has been successful in homework completion and is working hard, celebrate that success with a special event (e.g., pizza, a walk, a trip to the park) to reinforce the positive effort.
